SHORT BIOGRAPHIES - 2018 AUSTRALIAN COTTON INDUSTRY AWARDS RECIPIENTS

2018 Monsanto Grower of the Year

Brett Corish, Corish Management Pty Ltd, 'Mundine', Goondiwindi, QLD

Brett grew up on a farm in Queensland, which he today farms. The property is approximately 10,000 hectares in size, comprised of 2000 hectares of developed country, 2500 hectares of dryland farming and the balance grazing and bushland. Brett planted 800 hectares of fully irrigated cotton for the 2016-2017 season, seeing an average yield of 12.8 bales to the hectare. Mundine's water allocation comes solely from the nearby Macintyre River, and it implements several different types of irrigation systems. Brett is passionate about ensuring that the business is sustainable moving forward, so that it may be able to be passed on to future generations.

2018 AgriRisk High Achiever of the Year

Bernie Bierhoff, Farm Manager at Avondale Ag, Rowena, NSW

Having managed Avondale Ag for more than a decade, Bernie Bierhoff knows his way around a cotton farm. A family owned and run business, Avondale Ag is fully irrigated with flood irrigation on its irrigation country. The procedures that Bernie has put into place on the property ensures that water can be moved around cost effectively and efficiently, which in turn helps the business achieve consistent yields. Bernie is actively involved in his local community, in the thick of fundraising efforts for the local school through Avondale Ag as well as working closely with the Walgett Cotton Growers Association. Bernie is committed to farming for the future, looking after the soils for the next generation.

2018 Chris Lehmann Trust Young Cotton Achiever of the Year, sponsored by Bayer CropScience

William Back, Auscott Ltd, Narrabri, NSW

William is an experienced agronomist who has recently taken on the role as manager of Auscott Ltd Narrabri's significant farming operation. He is responsible for the day-to-day operations of the 9,000 hectare cotton farm, enjoying the support of Auscott Ltd to pursue his desire to be at the forefront of cotton development. William has been involved in various on-farm programs that are making important contributions to the constant improvement and management of cotton, such as running trials in cooperation with other researchers and organisations.

2018 Cotton Seed Distributors Researcher of the Year

Dr Joseph Foley, Dr Malcolm Gillies and Dr Alison McCarthy, University of Southern QLD, Toowoomba, QLD

The University of Southern Queensland's National Centre for Engineering in Agriculture smart automated irrigation team is made up of Dr Joseph Foley, Dr Allison McCarthy and Dr Malcolm Gillies. The team's most recent work has drawn upon many technological developments in irrigation management, measurement, and control for application in cotton irrigation systems. The team has brought engineering expertise and knowledge to the cotton industry in a number of areas, such as in-field irrigation and water management skills, as well as software and instrumentation development for irrigation improvement.

2018 IPF Service to Industry Award

David Montgomery, Moree, NSW

Leaving Ireland at just 19, David Montgomery drove his war-time Jeep from London to Calcutta in his pursuit building a life in Australia. Arriving in Darwin in 1962, he found a job that same day. With dreams and a vision for the future, David hitchhiked to Moree where he has lived ever since. This stamina, determination and courage have been the secrets of David's success as a cotton grower, marketer and industry visionary who has dedicated more than 30 years to advancing the Australian cotton industry.

Planting his first crop of cotton in 1979, David went on to grow cotton in Emerald, the Darling Downs, Gwydir and Murrumbidgee regions. Having amassed a wealth of experience, knowledge

and perspective about the industry, David was instrumental in establishing the Dunavant Australia ginning and marketing business here in 1984, steering its development as Chief Executive Officer until 2002. It was David's foresight that saw the introduction of marketing options such as forward contracts for growers, something that went on to become standard practice in the cotton industry.

Founding and contributing to a number of cotton industry organisations, David was a Board Member and Chairman of the Australian Cotton Shippers Association, Director of Cotton Australia and played a key role at the Australian Cotton Industry Council, firstly as Deputy Chairman, then Chairman.
